Okyo Salon 2903 M St. N.W.; 202-342-2675 the price \$150 and up the scoop Owner Bernard Portelli, who has tinted the tresses of Catherine Deneuve, is not only fastidious about where he places color, but he also meticulously times each dyed area so hair is evenly lightened throughout. To keep bleach from running onto nearby strands, Portelli wraps rolled cotton strips around the foils at the root to absorb excess formula. He also adds darker pieces under the highlighted layers to create the illusion of dimension, so hair looks as if it has extra body as well as natural shine. ■

TEMPORARY HIGHLIGHTS

Afraid of commitment? Experts recommend these ways to add glow on the go:

► **Spray them in** Jerome Russell's line of temporary spray-in tints (right, \$5 each; Ricky's, 877-447-4259) lets you add anything from golden to auburn tones to hair. Separate a ¼-inch section of hair, hold up, and thoroughly spray from near the roots all the way to ends.

► **Clip them in** Easihair Easilite clip-in highlights (\$60 for six-piece set; 800-462-9447) are one-inch strips of hair you can custom order to add highlights or lowlights in more than 80 shades. Made from human hair, they clip on under the top layers of hair right at the root and blend in seamlessly to create natural-looking accents. These extensions can be styled, curled and flatironed too.
